Putting a time on the planning guide will help in keeping the meeting on time.

Dress the part. If your theme is pirates then wear an eye patch and get the awards from a treasure chest.

Proudly wear your uniform with all patches and neck ware.

Bring the Boys up front and sit them on the floor so they can see better.

Cub Master Minute.

In Scouting we use a compass to show us the way and a flash light to light our path. In life we all need a strong moral compass and a way in which to light our trail through life. Cub Scouting can provide that moral compass and the faith to light our way. The leaders and parents should keep this in mind at all times when guiding young Cub Scouts. Thanks to all the leaders and parents.

Make sure all camping is coordinated.

Check with your camping director often to make sure all dens are aware of all camping opportunities. Make sure all den leaders know what those opportunities are.

Recharter

Online Rechartering. You will be sent a password for this online activity. Round table meetings are the best place to gain information on this job.

Make sure all boys make rank by blue and gold or by summer.

Check with your leaders to ensure everyone knows what your goals are.

If you set a goal that all boys should have rank by Blue and Gold your leaders will work towards that goal.

Plan and execute Blue and gold awards, (Tiger, Wolf, Bear, Webelos) arrow of light and cross over ceremonies. Blue and Gold should be a time where most of the boys get there respective rank. Each should have it's own ceremony and be special. This should be in addition to any entertainment your planning staff have in mind.

Ensure all Cub Scouts in your unit have an opportunity to earn the summer activity pin.

After completing these requirements the batch can then be displayed on the right pocket of the uniform.

Wolf

There are 12 Achievements for Wolf:

While working on this rank the Cub Scout can wear a progress towards rank bead holder. This can be worn on the right pocket and a yellow or gold bead is give for every 3 Achievements completed.

Once a Cub Scout has earned his rank of Wolf he can then begin to earn Arrow Points. Arrow points can be earned by completing Arrow point activities in the back of the Wolf book. For the first 10 he gets a gold arrow point. Then for each additional 10 he gets a silver arrow point.

Bear

The Bear program is similar to the Wolf program in many ways. However the achievements are different

The same progress towards rank can be worn for Bears as was worn for Wolves. To Get Bear Rank the Cub Scout must complete 12 activities. He can get one red bead for each 3 activities completed.

Arrow point can be earned after rank is earned. Is arrow point program is the same as the Wolf program. First 10 gold. Next 10 silver.

Webelos 1

Webelos Rank Requirements.

These can be found on page 49 of the Webelos hand book.

You should work on the Webelos rank with the Webelos 1 boys.

Webelos 2 (second year Webelos)

This group should work on the Arrow of Light award. This award is one of only two that can be worn on a Boy Scout uniform and later an adult uniform. This is one of the most important awards a Cub Scout can earn. You as Cub Master need to work with your den leaders to ensure all the boys earn this award.

Requirements for Belt Loops.

Any Cub Scout can earn and wear Cub Scout Belt Loops. These are metal awards that are worn on a standard Cub Scout Belt. To get them on take off the buckle then slide them on. Then return the buckle. Your pack should have a Belt Loop Program Book that tells the requirements for each belt loop. There are different groups for belt loops.

Academics

Art Astronomy, Chess Citizenship, Collecting Communicating, Computers, Geography, Geology, Heritages, Language, Culture, Map and Compass, Mathematics, Music, Science, Weather, Wildlife and Conservation.

Sports

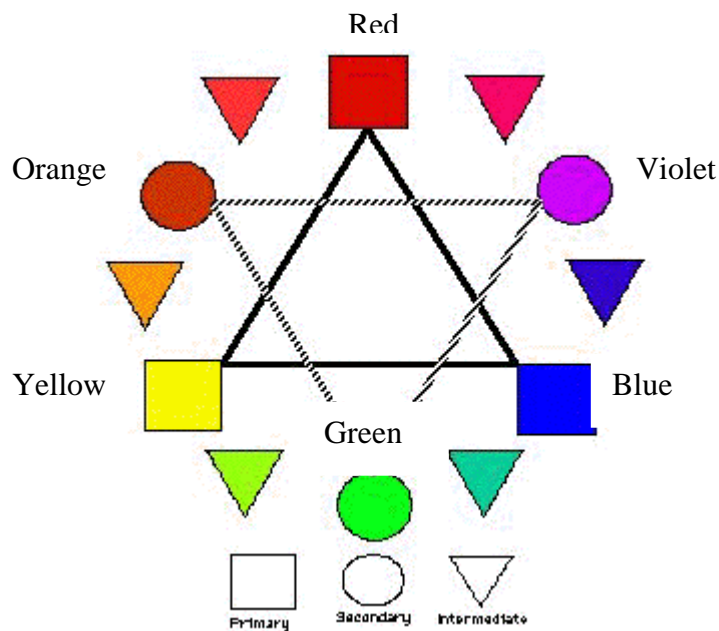
Art Belt Loop

Ceremonies

Bobcat

Prepare batches by tying loop on each batch. You can use hot glue for this but use very little. Hang batches from stick or arrow. Have someone dress in costume Indian, pirates, Daniel Boone guy. Anything will do. Use candles to call the spirit of the Bobcat require all to recite the Cub Scout promise and do the Cub Scout sign and salute. Then from a list on wood or leather (scroll or tree bark) read the names and present award.

Wolf

Candles work great to set the mood. You can also put a candle in a bowl of baking soda and at the end add vinegar to create a great effect to put out the candle. One idea is to print the names of the boys getting rank on disappearing paper. Have the boy put the paper in the cup of water. If it dissolves the boy is true and honest deserving of his new rank. (All will of course disappear.)

Bear

You can put up a small tent and put 2 boys scouts in it. This is a bear cave and the boys must go in and wrestle the bear and bring out some bear meat. The scouts never touch the bear and the meat is beef jerky.

Webelos 1

If the Webelos 1 do not have their tan shirts. Have the boys parents bring A new tan shirt with all batches to the blue and gold. Set up a curtain then have the parents of each boy behind the curtain take off the blue shirt and put on the tan one. While this is going on behind the curtain you will talk about the transition from Cub Scout to Boy Scout. Webelos are being readied for Boy Scouts and on to Eagle.

Starting with the rank of Bear the boys can earn their whittling chip.

This gives them the right to carry and use a pocket knife. Bear book Page 146. Shaving and chips.

I also recommend using an additional document used to reinforce the idea's and rules talked about in the book. See index for document.

Camping

Day camp

Day camp is 3 to 5 days. Days only. Your boys must be accompanied by adults. Do this by asking each parent that sends a child to donate one day to the camp. This way you will have enough parents.

Dad and Lad

Dad and son camping for Tigers making Wolf before May. This One night and usually less than 24 hours. BB gun, Archery, swimming and Camp fire program are just a few of the activities at this camp. A great place for dad and son to spend time together in a structured Program.

Mini Webelos

3 nights tent camping, hiking, BB guns, archery, swimming camp fire and much more. This camp only requires that a minimum of 2 scouts and 2 adults go. This requirement can be met by camping with other units. Talk to your camp director or counselor for more details.

Webelos

One week at Scout camp. 5 nights of tent camping swimming and more. Same as Mini Webelos only 5 nights long.

Family Camp

You can do this at any state or local park. Call them and ask for their "Special Use Area ". Rent it for a week end. Have a hike, camp fire, crafts and games. This can be great fun for all. Don't forget the smores for the camp fire. (smore – gram cracker, chocolate bar and marshmallows.) Add in a foil pack dinner and a few songs and jokes around the camp fire and you have a great time in the outdoors.

Cub Scout Pack 760 Knife carrying requirements

Part 1 - learning permit requirements

1. Parent or guardian must sign learning permit request.
2. Knife to be used after learning permit is granted must be identified or purchased and be approved by both den leader and Cub Master. Only official Cub Scout knives purchased at the Scout shop will be approved for use by Cub Scouts.
3. Cub Scout must learn all “safe knife handling rules” and be able to recall them when asked by the den leader and by the Cub Master.
4. Must comply with all rules in Bear book “whittling chit activity”.
5. After Cub Scout has learned all rules and learning permit form has been signed by parent or guardian, both den leaders and Cub Master. The Cub Scout can then, under adult supervision only, begin to learn how to handle a knife. This will include all of Bear book “whittling chit activity” and the safe knife handling part of this document.

Part 2 - learning how to use a knife

- 1 Learn how to handle and use a knife.
- 2 Make a project using the knife.
- 3 Show project and demonstrate to his parents, Den Leaders and Cub Master he knows how to use his knife and care for his knife.
- 4 He then can get a permit to carry and use an official Cub Scout pocket knife. The knife is only to be carried and used on Cub Scout approved outings. These outings will be planned and the Cub Scout will be told when he can bring his knife. If the Cub Scout brings his knife to a Scouting event without approval, he will loose the knife and the chit for a time that will be determined by the leaders of the pack.

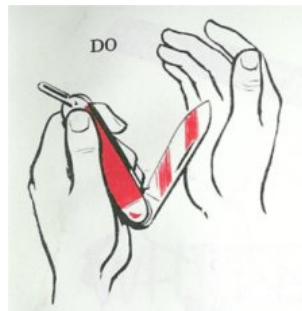

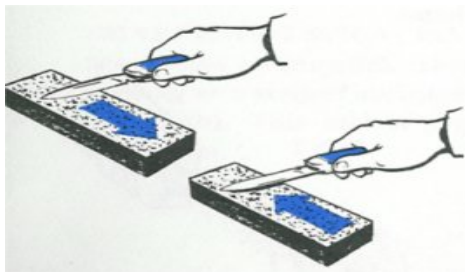

HOW TO KEEP A KNIFE SHARP: Get a sharpening stone from your council service center or a hardware store. Lay the blade edge on the stone. Raise the back of the blade slightly and pull across the stone with blade edge toward you in a cutting motion. Turn blade over and push it away from you. Continue until edge is sharp.

Knife carrying learning permit request

I (Cub Scouts Name _____) will learn the safe knife handling rules and keep my knife safe, sharp, and dry. I will always be safe when I carry or use my knife. I will make sure others are safe when I use or carry my knife. I will take responsibility for the safe use and care of my knife at all times.

Safe knife handling rules

1. You and YOU alone are responsible for what happens when you are in possession of the knife. If you or someone else is injured with your knife you are responsible. If someone takes your knife you must inform an adult right a way. This is also your responsibility.
2. A knife is not a toy and should never be treated as one.
3. A knife is dangerous and should be treated with respect at all times.
4. A knife should never be used for anything but cutting.
5. Always cut away from your self.
6. Never point the knife at anyone.
7. Keep the knife out of the fire.
8. When not in use the knife should be closed and in your pocket.
9. If you or someone is injured with a knife you should tell an adult right a way.
10. Do not carry an open knife.
11. Never use your knife to carve or cut into trees or other property that is not yours.

Knife carrying permit request

1. Cub Scout has completed learning permit requirements.
2. Cub Scout has demonstrated safe use of his knife to the leader listed below. He will do this by showing he can whittle with his knife in a controlled setting.
3. He will then show his den his project and tell who is responsible for the safe handling of his knife.

Handling a Knife

1. When opening a knife use both hands taking care not to handle the sharp end of the blade.
2. When closing a knife use both hands. The hand on the blade should be open with palm on back side of blade. The other hand should be holding the knife on the outside to ensure fingers are not cut when blade is closed.
3. When checking the sharpness of the knife blade you should lightly drag your finger across the blade not along its length.
4. When using your knife always cut away from your self and never toward anyone else.
5. Sharpen knife with knife sharpening stone. Use oil and a safe back and forth motion to sharpen your knife.

After completing all the above to the satisfaction of all the leaders listed below the Cub Scout will then be issued a “Whittling Chit” . This will allow the Cub Scout to carry and use his Cub Scout knife in approved Cub Scout setting.

Cub Master Smarts

Tell the temperature by the crickets

The frequency of chirping varies according to temperature. To get a rough estimate of the temperature in degrees Fahrenheit, count the number of chirps in 15 seconds and then add 37. The number you get will be an approximation of the outside temperature.

So, how do crickets make that chirping sound?

Usually, the males are the "singers." The male cricket rubs a scraper (a sharp ridge on his wing) against a series of wrinkles, or "files", on the other wing. The tone of the chirping depends upon the distance between the wrinkles.

There are several reasons why crickets chirp. They may be:

- Calling to attract a female with a loud and monotonous sound
- Courting a nearby female with a quick, softer chirp
- Behaving aggressively during the encounter of two males
- Sounding a danger alert when sensing trouble

Crickets are part of the family Orthoptera (grasshoppers and katydids).

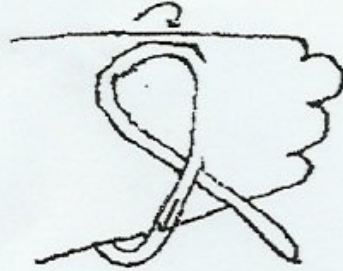

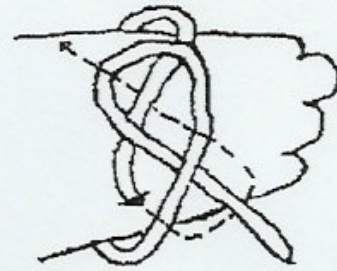

The Friendship Knot

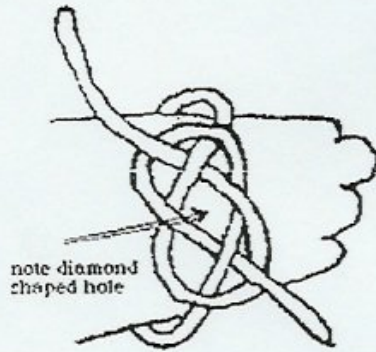
(aka Knife Lanyard Knot)



I - underhand loop in palm

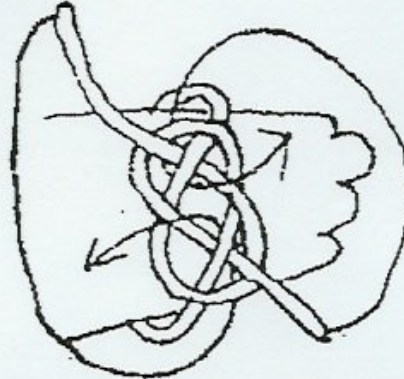


II- bring end around back hand and under first loop as shown
Dashed line shows next step.

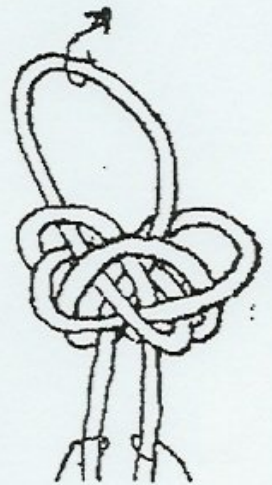
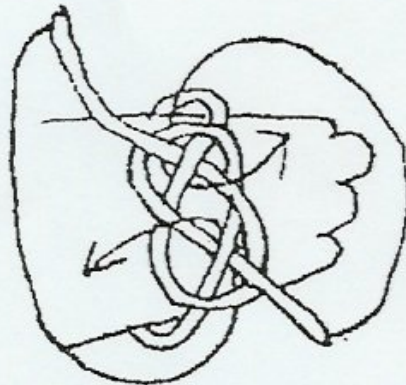


note diamond shaped hole
